Equity: Coordination of contracts with **Homeless Healthcare** and two **Street Doctor** programs; **1,499 mobile GP clinics** and **14,711 consultations provided**. <u>360 Street Doctor secured a new truck</u> with medical fit-out to expand service provision including a new Armadale clinic. The new truck has the very latest technology and has **improved accessibility** for clients who need mobility assistance.

The Home2Health Research Team completed evaluation of **discretionary brokerage funds** provided to hospital social workers which supported **safer discharges** and health access: 207 patients experiencing homelessness supported; 85% of expenditure spent on short-term accommodation; 57% of individuals had **fewer emergency department presentations**.

Integration: Health Innovation Fund - Completed research to identify key components of integrated primary healthcare service models. 27 interviews completed with service providers and people with a lived experience of homelessness. Twelve key components identified including five theories on how and why integration works: client self-efficacy; client self-determination; staff self-efficacy to deliver adequate care; organisational culture; and individual and systemic trust between staff, clients, organisations, and sectors. Commenced an evaluation trial of key components of integrated service delivery models in 2023-2024.

Engagement: Department of Health **representation on relevant working groups and forums** including with Department of Communities Office of Homelessness; and Common Ground; Mental Health Commission; Australian and Western Australian Alliances to End Homelessness (A3HN, WAAEH); WA Primary Health Alliance. Convene the interagency Department of Health Homelessness Advisory Committee to inform **coordinated healthcare responses** for people experiencing homelessness.

Information: Engaged Deloitte and the Centre for Social Impact UWA (CSI UWA) to clarify homelessness definitions in WA Health, and review trends in hospital use. A WA Health standardised definition based on the Australian Bureau of Statistics was proposed as part of the 2016 Clinical Senate of WA recommendations. Deloitte and CSI UWA identified barriers to operationalising a standard definition including: inconsistent implementation within patient administration systems; and limited training and education to health staff on homelessness. Work continues to gather information about homelessness definitions for use within healthcare.

Workforce development: Scoping existing **workforce training modules** on homelessness (e.g. trauma-informed care, strengths-based, personcentred to meet diverse needs) in partnership with the Curtin University Allied Health Honours program. Fourth-year occupational therapy students are conducting a **systematic scope of national and international literature** to identify content around homelessness for health professionals.
