COVID-19 Case numbers

- As of 14 April 2020, there are 527 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Western Australia (WA).
- To date 23,870 people who have been tested for COVID-19 in WA have returned a negative result.
- WA: Daily snapshot

Testing Criteria

Note: Testing should **not** be done for 'clearance' or return to work purposes (except for healthcare workers).

As of 9 April 2020, COVID-19 testing criteria have been expanded:

General population

Any person presenting with a fever \geq 38°C **OR** history of fever (e.g. sweats, chills) **OR** an acute respiratory infection (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat) can be considered for testing, where an alternative diagnosis is not more likely.

High-risk settings

Anyone working within a high-risk setting who presents with **EITHER** a fever ≥38°C **OR** an acute respiratory infection will be tested. This includes healthcare workers, aged care and disability workers, and Western Australian Police Officers.

Testing will also be arranged for anyone from the following high-risk settings where two or more people are experiencing **EITHER** a fever ≥38°C **OR** an acute respiratory infection:

- aged and residential care
- o rural and remote Aboriginal communities
- o detention centres
- correctional facilities
- boarding schools
- o military barracks or equivalent
- o geographically localised areas with increased risk of community transmission
- o cruise ship passengers or returned travellers (international and domestic).

Summary of key information

- Series of National Guidelines <u>SoNGs</u> The SoNG was last updated on 6 April 2020, with a revised COVID-19 case definition.
- Latest Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC) Statement 9 April 2020
- COVID-19 State of Emergency Declarations are now in place to prevent the spread of COVID-19. All declarations are available on the <u>Department of Premier and Cabinet</u> <u>website</u>.
- <u>COVID-19 Community Advice</u> is available on the Department of Premier and Cabinet website summarising the COVID-19 related Directions that are in place in WA.
- On 1 April, under the WA Public Health Act 2016, the Chief Health Officer issued a
 Direction to prohibit a person from using a point-of-care (POC) serological (blood) test
 (including an assay or device) as a diagnostic tool for acute illness with COVID-19. Point
 of care serology testing Direction
- New Emergency Management Powers and increased penalties for COVID-19 related incidents passed through both houses of State Parliament on 2 April. The new laws enable authorities to:
 - issue \$1,000 on-the-spot fines for individuals and \$5,000 fines for businesses to act as a further deterrent against those in the community who do not follow new directions.
 - allow for a person to be subject to electronic monitoring while they are in selfisolation.
 - impose a penalty of 12 months' imprisonment or a fine of \$12,000 for people who
 do not comply with electronic monitoring requirements.
 - include powers to compel people to provide information about any recent travel undertaken by them, and information about people with whom they have been in close contact.
 - enable emergency management authorities to direct that any road, access route or areas of water in or leading to an emergency area be closed.
- Travel between regions in Western Australia was restricted from midnight 31 March 2020. Regional boundaries mirror those of the state's Regional Development Commissions. Further details can be found on the Department of Premier and Cabinet website.
- WA Premier announced Stage 3 restrictions from 11:59pm Tuesday, 31 March 2020.
 The WA Government's strong guidance to all Western Australians is to stay home
 unless for shopping, medical or health care needs, exercise (in compliance with
 guidelines), work and study (if is not possible to work or learn remotely). Exceptions
 to this include:

- people of the same household going out together
- o funerals a maximum of 10 people
- o weddings a maximum of 5 people.
